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I saw the headlines that a girl had been murdered on Ocean Beach, her body left floating in the ruins of the old Sutro Baths. I knew it was Shaw, as surely as if he'd signed his name to his work. I didn't need to see his smug smirk at the showcase to confirm it. He delights in losing himself in the frenzy of beating and mutilation. His subjects can rarely be identified by teeth or even fingerprints.

I already saw the piece he's showing tonight. Mine is better.

Everything is excess with him. All the color, all the bold strokes, all the symbolism hitting you over the head.

Still, I'm sure he'll sell a thousand prints, whether he wins tonight's prize or not. Alastor is nothing if not industrious. His genius for self-promotion far exceeds his genius for art.

He catches my eye as he swaggers into the gallery, giving me the merest suggestion of a smile, a tug of the lips that shows the glint of bleached teeth. I give him nothing in return.

He looks tanned, despite the viscous fog covering the city all week. Several women flock toward him, including Betsy Voss, who organized this event.

She smiles up at Shaw, resting her hand lightly on his forearm as she laughs at some joke he's made.

Alastor grins back at her, his face boyishly animated.

He reminds me of a pitcher plant, exuding sticky sweetness to lure in flies.

I know most of the people milling around, drinking complimentary glasses of merlot, examining the work on display, arguing its merit with increasing abandon as the wine takes hold.

It's all the same people, the same ass-kissing conversation.

I'm so fucking bored.

The San Francisco art scene is incestuous. Everyone knows everyone else, in both the common and biblical senses. Betsy and Alastor have fucked before, though she doesn't have to worry about ending up in the Sutro Baths—she's much too useful as a broker for Shaw's art.

In fact, the only person within my view I don't recognize is the skinny girl shoving cheese in her mouth over at Betsy's excellent buffet spread. Betsy never skimps—she's provided a generous selection of fresh fruit, sandwiches, and macarons. The girl is demolishing the smoked gouda like she hasn't eaten in a week, which she probably hasn't. Another starving artist scavenging on the outskirts.

The girl has tried to dress up for the occasion: she's wearing a loose white shift dress, crisp and bright enough that she must have acquired it recently. Her boots tell another story—the battered Docs look older than she is. A botanical tattoo runs down one bird-like collarbone.

I'm about to turn my gaze to a more interesting subject when the girl collides with Jack Brisk, curator of contemporary art at SFMOMA. The fault is his—he was gesturing aggressively with his chubby hands—but it's the girl who pays the price. Merlot splashes from Brisk's glass down the front of her dress, the wine soaking into the white cotton as if it were blotting paper.

“So sorry,” Brisk says carelessly, barely glancing at the girl, who is clearly a nobody, before turning back to his conversation.

I watch the girl's face to see if she'll cry or rage or fall over herself apologizing to Brisk in return.

She does none of the above. She examines the stains, a crease forming between her eyebrows. Then she picks up her own glass of wine and strides off toward the bathrooms.

I begin making the rounds of the pieces I haven't yet seen. It's obvious which will be in the running for the prize. Art may be subjective, but quality shines like brass next to gold.

I'm guessing Rose Clark, Alastor Shaw, and I will be the top contenders.

My piece is superior. That should be obvious simply from the crowd of people around it, who linger longer and whisper more intently than they do for anyone else's work.

The complicating factor is the panel of judges, which includes Carl Danvers, a bitter misanthrope who has never forgiven me for making a joke at his expense at a gala eight years ago. I intended for him to overhear, but I underestimated his capacity for spite. He's taken every opportunity for revenge since, even at the cost of his own credibility.

Alastor sidles up behind me.

I hear him coming from a mile away. He has the subtlety of a bison.

"Hello, Shaw," I reply.

He uses my given name to annoy me.

He thinks because he knows certain things about me, that there's an intimacy between us.

There is no intimacy. The emotion is all from one side.

"How's your weekend going?" he asks, barely able to contain his grin.

He desperately wants me to acknowledge what he's done. I prefer to deny him that pleasure. But it's probably better to get this over with so he'll fuck off and leave me alone.

"Uneventful," I reply. "I don't think you can say the same."

Now he allows himself to grin, showing those perfect capped teeth, those boyish dimples, the gleam in those warm brown eyes that make women go weak with the impulse to smile back at him, to run their fingers through his sun-streaked hair.

"I love a college co-ed," he says, his voice low and guttural.

He wets his lips, his features dissolving into lust at the memory of what he did.

I take a slow breath to dispel my distaste.

Alastor's need disgusts me.

He's such a cliché of himself. College co-eds, for fuck's sake.

"You and Bundy," I murmur, my lips barely moving.

Shaw's eyes narrow.

"Oh, you're above that, are you?" he sneers. "You don't feel a certain urge when you see something like that?"

He jerks his head toward a stunning blonde bent over to examine the details of a floor-level installation, her tight red dress clinging to the curves of her ass.

"Or what about that?" Shaw says, inclining his head in the direction of a slim Asian girl, whose nipples are clearly visible through the gauzy material of her top.

I don't kill women, typically.

This is not out of any petty moral constraint.

It's just too fucking easy.

I could overpower either of those women like they were small children. Where's the challenge? The sense of accomplishment?

"I'm not a hedonist," I say to Alastor, coldly.

His face darkens and he opens his mouth to retort, but at that moment, the girl comes striding back into the gallery, chin upraised, dark hair streaming behind her.

I had thought she was going to the bathroom to attempt the impossible task of washing those stains out of her dress.

Quite the opposite: she's tie-dyed the entire thing.

She's used merlot to make a textile of deep burgundy, magenta, and mulberry in delicate watercolor layers. I'm staring at the dress because it surprises me—not only in the concept but in the execution. It's really quite beautiful. Nothing I would have expected to emerge from a bathroom after eight minutes' work.

Alastor follows my gaze. He sees my interest while completely missing the reason behind it.

"Her?" he says softly. "You surprise me, Cole. I've never seen you take a stroll in the gutter before."

I turn away from the girl, irritation swelling inside of me.

"You think I'd be attracted to some filthy little scabbler with bitten fingernails and raggedy shoelaces?" I sneer.

Everything about that girl repulses me, from her unwashed hair to the dark circles under her eyes. She radiates neglect.

But Shaw is certain he's made a discovery. He thinks he caught me in some unguarded moment.

"Maybe I'll go talk to her," he says, testing me.

"I wish you would," I reply. "Anything to end this conversation."

With that, I stride off toward the open bar.

The hours pass slowly from eight o'clock to ten.

I slip in and out of conversations, soaking in the ready praise for my piece.

“You never cease to amaze me,” Betsy says, her pale blue eyes peering up at me through the rims of her expensive designer glasses. “How on earth did you think of using spider silk? And how did you acquire it?”

She’s giving me the same look of dazzled admiration she gave to Shaw, but she doesn’t dare rest her hand on my forearm like she did to him.

Everyone says the prize is as good as mine—or at least, everyone with taste.

I can see Alastor sulking over by the canapés. He’s received a hefty helping of accolades, but he’s noted the difference in tenor as well as I have. Compliments for him, raves for me.

I want the prize because I deserve it.

I couldn’t give a shit about the money—ten thousand dollars means nothing to me. I’ll make ten times that amount when I sell the sculpture.

Still, a cold foreboding steals over me when Betsy calls the crowd to order, saying, “Thank you all for coming tonight! I’m sure you’re anxious to hear what our judges have decided.”

I already know what she’s about to say even before she casts me a guilty look.

“After much debate, we’ve decided to award tonight’s prize to Alastor Shaw!”

The applause that breaks out has a nervy tension. Alastor is popular, but half the crowd is casting glances in my direction to see how I’ll react.

I keep my face as smooth as still water and my hands tucked in my pockets. I don’t applaud along with them because I don’t care about looking gracious.

“So the rivalry continues!” Brisk says to me, his face florid with drink.

“The Lakers and the Clippers aren’t rivals just because they both play basketball,” I say, loud enough for Shaw to hear.

The sports metaphor is for Alastor's benefit, digging under his skin like a barb.

While Brisk chortles, a flush rises up Shaw's neck. His thick fingers clench around the delicate stem of his champagne flute until I can almost hear the glass cracking.

"Congratulations," I say to Shaw, not bothering to hide my disdain. "It doesn't surprise me that Danvers was impressed by your work—he struggles when the message is open to interpretation."

"Not every piece of art has to be a riddle," Alastor snarls.

"Cole!" Betsy says, pushing her way toward me. "I hope you're not too disappointed—I liked your piece better."

"So does Shaw," I reply. "He just won't admit it."

Betsy wheels around, noticing Shaw directly behind her. She gulps, her face turning pink.

"Your painting was wonderful, too, of course, Alastor!"

Without bothering to reply, he stalks away from us.

"Put my foot in my mouth, didn't I?" Betsy says. "Well, it's what everyone's saying. These prizes are so political."

"Or personal," I say.

Sure enough, Danvers isn't finished venting his spleen. The following morning he publishes his review of the showcase, with several poorly-veiled barbs thrown in my direction:

*WHILE BLACKWELL'S work continues to exhibit his usual level of precision, there's a cold technicality to his technique that fails to inspire the same level of energy stirred up by Alastor Shaw's frenetic, colorful constructions. There's a wild abandon to Shaw's work that Blackwell would do well to emulate.*



I CAN JUST IMAGINE Alastor smirking over his morning coffee, scrolling through the article on his phone.

Danvers's opinion on my art means less to me than the twittering of the birds outside my window.

However, I do feel a deep sense of rage that he dares to attack me so publicly.

Just as Shaw's belief that we're rivals offends me, so do Danvers's pretensions that he can judge me.

I finish my breakfast, the same meal I eat every morning: an espresso, two slices of bacon, half an avocado, and a perfectly poached egg set atop a slice of grilled sourdough.

Then I wash and dry the dishes, setting them back in their places in the cabinet.

I'm already showered and dressed for the day.

I walk to my studio, which is close to my house on the sea cliffs north of the city. The vast, sunlit space once housed a chocolate factory. Now the bare steel, glass, brick, and concrete form an open cage in which I do my work.

I don't commission my pieces, though I could certainly afford to do so. Every step of the process is completed by me, even on my most complicated or technical sculptures. I've built my own custom equipment for welding, gilding, cutting, and soldering. Winches and scaffolding. Even pneumatic lifts for the largest pieces.

I keep no assistants, working entirely alone.

I start at ten o'clock in the morning and labor until dinner. The kitchen is stocked with drinks and snacks, but I rarely take breaks for either.

Today I'm beginning a new piece in the same series.

I know how I want it to look—organic and yet deconstructed. I want the elements of the sculpture to appear to hang in space.

But when I look over the materials at hand, nothing seems right.

The iron is too heavy. The steel lacks luster.

I picture the precise curved shape that I want—like the hull of a ship, or the rib of a whale.

Then I smile as inspiration surges through me.



I WAIT outside the Siren offices on Cabrillo Street.

It's a dingy, low-slung building with a tin roof on which a light rain patters.

Rain is incredibly useful. It obscures the view, forces people to keep their heads down, urges them to run from place to place without lingering, without looking around.

Umbrellas are even better.

I stand in the alleyway, watching Danvers through the greasy little window of his office.

You learn everything about a person when they think they're alone.

I watch Danvers take a tin of nuts out of his drawer, open them, and eat a few handfuls, wiping his salty palm on the leg of his jeans. He pushes the nuts away as if he's not going to eat anymore. But a few minutes later, he takes another handful. Then, in a burst of motivation, he puts the lid back on the tin and encloses the tin within the drawer. That lasts even less time before he opens the drawer and takes another handful.

After a while, Danvers's receptionist comes into his office. She's already wearing her coat and carrying her purse, eager to leave before the weather worsens.

Danvers steps between her and the doorway, blocking her path with his soft-shouldered body, ignoring several hesitant steps in his direction as she hints at him to release her.

His chatting stretches out agonizingly slow. I see the girl touch the phone in her pocket several times, probably feeling the vibration of text messages from friends who might be waiting for her at some nearby cafe or restaurant.

Finally, he lets her go. I expect him to follow her out—the receptionist was the last person left in the office besides Danvers himself.

Instead, he stands there awkwardly, before sinking into his chair once more.

Frustrated by whatever attention he failed to drain from the receptionist, he pours the remaining nuts directly into his mouth and flings the tin at the wastepaper basket in the corner, missing it by two feet. I see him mouth the word *fuck*, though he doesn't bother to pick up the tin.

He scrolls through Facebook for a while. Though he's facing the window with his computer screen turned away from me, I can see its reflection on his glasses. He opens a word doc, types a few sentences, then closes the document again. Apparently he exhausted all his creative energy slandering me this morning.

At long last, Danvers shuts off his computer, retrieving his coat from a hook on the wall. I'm pleased to see he neglected to bring his umbrella.

Danvers shuts off the last of the office lights, locking the door behind him.

I step out of the alleyway, avoiding the camera perched on the northwest corner of the squat brick building.

Once my umbrella is open, I'm nothing but a tall, dark stalk beneath its black canopy.

I pretend to hustle along the sidewalk, head down, lost in thought, until Danvers and I brush shoulders.

"Carl," I say in mock surprise. "Didn't see you there."

"Cole," Danvers replies, a little nervous. He's wondering if I read his article—if I'm here to harangue him.

"Is that the Siren office?" I say, as if I didn't know.

"That's right," he says, stiff and wary.

"My studio's right over there." I gesture in the direction of Fulton, where as Danvers well knows, the rent is triple what the Siren probably pays.

“Is it?” Danvers says vaguely, looking the other way toward Balboa where he takes the streetcar back to his condo.

The rain is falling harder now, plastering his thinning hair against his skull, bringing out the rat-like quality of his protuberant nose and underbite.

“Share my umbrella,” I say as if I only just noticed him getting soaked.

I reorient the canopy so it covers us both.

“Thanks,” Danvers says grudgingly.

And then, because it’s human nature to seek conciliation, to give a favor for a favor, Danvers says, “No hard feelings about the showcase I hope. It was stiff competition.”

“I’m not one for grudges,” I reply.

He squints at me through his foggy glasses. I’m sure he’s wondering if I saw the review. Perhaps even wishing that he hadn’t written it, because at the end of the day, Carl Danvers has a desperate need to be liked. It was my public mockery that first spurred his rage against me. At any time, I could have disarmed him with a compliment. If I could bring myself to lie.

There’s nothing I admire in Danvers.

In fact, I’ve never admired anyone.

“I think you’ll find my current project much more absorbing,” I tell Danvers. And then, as if I just thought of it, “Would you like to see it? It’s still in progress, but it would get us out of the rain. I’ve got tea as well.”

Danvers is suspicious at this sudden offering of an olive branch. He studies my face, which I’ve carefully arranged to appear casual and almost distracted—as if I’m pulled back to my studio, inviting him along as an afterthought.

I see the greedy gleam in his eye. His distrust of me—sensible and warranted—battles with this undreamt-of offer: a view of my work in progress, which I never share with anyone. Just to see inside my studio, to be able to gossip about it and maybe describe it in an article, is a temptation Danvers can’t resist.

“I could come for a minute,” he says gruffly.

“This way, then.” I turn sharply to cross the road.

The rain thunders down, sluicing through the gutters, carrying trash and fallen leaves. I hardly have to watch for passing cars. The sidewalks are empty.

I cut through the route I’ve walked several times. The route with no ATMs or traffic cameras. Devoid of sidewalk restaurants or nosy homeless camped in tents.

If we were to encounter anyone along our way, I would cut this excursion short on the spot.

But no one intervenes. That sense of rightness settles over me—the one and only time I feel a connection to anything like fate or destiny. The moment when everything aligns in favor of the kill.

I let Danvers in through the back door. The lights are low. Our footsteps echo in the cavernous space. Danvers cranes his neck, trying to peer through the gloom, not noticing as he begins to traverse an expanse of thin plastic tarp.

I take the garrote from my pocket. Silently, I unspool the wire.

“I’d like to see your machinery,” he says, with ill-concealed eagerness. “Is it true you do all the manufacturing yourself?”

He’d love to catch me lying.

I’m closing the space between us, descending on Danvers like a hawk from the sky. He doesn’t hear my footsteps. He doesn’t feel my breath on his shoulder. He doesn’t notice my shadow engulfing his.

I wrap the wire around his neck and pull it taut, cutting off his breath like I snipped it short with a pair of shears.

His panic is instant.

He scrabbles at his throat, trying to grip the wire, but the razor-fine metal has already sunk into the soft flesh of his neck. He begins to thrash and buck. I take him down to the ground, pressing my knee into his back, pulling

crossways on the wire in a rowing motion.

Danvers's glasses have fallen off his face. They lay a few feet to the side, like a pair of blank eyes staring up at me.

Danvers himself is facedown, so I can't see his expression.

It wouldn't bother me to look into his face. I've done it before. I've watched the fear, the anguish, the suffering, all eventually sinking into dull resignation and then the utter blankness of death. Life over, snuffed out by the endless emptiness of the universe. Back from whence it came into nothingness, like a spark from a campfire disappearing into the night.

I could taunt him while I kill him.

I don't do it. What would be the point? In a moment he'll be gone forever. This is for me, not for him.

His struggles grow weaker, the bursts of effort further apart, like a flopping, dying fish.

My pressure on his throat is as relentless as ever.

I feel no sympathy. No guilt. Those are emotions I've never experienced.

I'm aware, academically, of the full range of human emotions. I've studied them intently so I can mimic their effects. But they have no power over me.

What I do feel, I feel intensely: rage, revulsion, and pleasure.

These are elemental forces inside of me, like wind, ocean, and molten rock.

I have to keep tight control upon them, or I'll be no better than Shaw, a slave to my impulses.

I'm not killing Danvers because I *have* to.

I'm killing him because I *want* to.

He was an irritation, an inconvenience. A worthless, sniveling, envious shit stain. He deserves nothing more than this. In fact, he should be honored, because I will make more of him than he ever could have made of himself. I will immortalize him so his spark burns bright at least for a moment in time.

I hear the crack of his hyoid bone fracturing.

His body goes limp. Three minutes later, I release him.

Then the butchering begins.

While I'm working, I feel a sense of purpose. I'm stimulated, interested, flushed with satisfaction.

This is the feeling I always get when I'm creating art.



THE SCULPTURE IS EXQUISITE. My best work yet.

I show it at Oasis, where I know Shaw will likewise display his latest work.

None of the bones are recognizable as a rib, a mandible, a femur. I filed them down, dipped them in gold, and mounted them in an entirely new arrangement. Still, their linear, organic shape remains. The sculpture lives, in a way it never would've had it been constructed of gilded metal or stone.

The response is immediate and ecstatic.

“My god, Cole, you’ve outdone yourself,” Betsy breathes, staring at the sculpture like it’s an idol. “What are you calling it?”

“*Fragile Ego*,” I reply.

Betsy laughs. “How uncharacteristically self-deprecating,” she says.

I say nothing in return, because as usual, Betsy has completely missed the point.

I’m not referencing my own ego, which is indestructible.

Before the night is out, my sculpture has sold for \$750,000 to some newly minted tech billionaire.

“Are they planning to melt it down for the gold?” Alastor says sourly.

He’s never sold a piece for half that much.

“I don’t think anyone’s bought a piece of *my* art just to destroy it,” I say, reminding Shaw that a fundamentalist church bought one of his paintings just to set it on fire. That was in his early days when he was a provocateur, not a salesman.

He’s in no mood for mockery tonight. His face looks puffy above the too-tight collar of his dress shirt, his broad chest rising and falling a little too rapidly.

He stares at the sculpture with unconcealed envy.

Shaw has talent, I can admit that.

But I have more.

Then, in the midst of his irritation and resentment, his entire expression changes. Understanding dawns.

“No . . .” he says softly. “You didn’t . . .”

I don’t have to confirm it, and I don’t bother to deny it. The truth is plain for anyone who has eyes to see.

Alastor lets out a sensual sigh.

“The balls on you . . .” he says. “To put it up for display . . .”

Briefly, he sets aside his jealousy. I set aside my loathing.

We gaze at the sculpture, sharing a moment of deep satisfaction.

Then his impulses take over and he can’t help sneering, “It took the small words of a small man to motivate you to make great art.”

Anger bubbles up inside of me, thick and hot.

Unlike Shaw, I don’t allow my emotions to shape my words. I carefully consider what will enrage him most.

Looking Alastor right in the eyes, I say, “No one will ever talk about your work the way they talk about mine. It must eat you up inside every day, waking up to your own mediocrity. You will never be great. Do you want to know why?”



He's fixed in place, the sneer frozen on his lips.

"It's because you lack discipline," I tell him.

Now his fury washes over him, his fists clenched and trembling at his sides, his thick shoulders shaking.

"You're no different than me," he hisses. "You're no better."

"I am better," I say. "Because whatever I do, I'm always in control."

I walk away from him then, so those words can echo and echo in the emptiness of his head.





## MARA ELDRITCH

I get up at an ungodly hour so I can shower before all the hot water is gone.

I share a moldering Victorian row house with eight other artists. The house was hacked into flats by someone with no respect for building codes and very little understanding of basic geometry. Thin plywood walls divide the rooms into triangles and trapezoids with no consideration for how a rectangular bed is supposed to fit in the space. The slanting, rotted floors and sagging ceilings add to the madhouse effect.

I occupy the tiny attic space at the very top of the house—sweltering hot in summer, and frigid in winter. Still, it's a coveted perch because it provides access to a small private balcony. I like to drag my mattress out on cool nights to sleep under the stars. That's the closest I've ever come to camping.

My whole life has been spent in this city, often in worse houses than this.

I've never known anything but fog and ocean breeze, and streets that roll up and down in dizzying hills that make your calves burn and your body lean like a tree in wind.

The pipes shudder as I turn on the shower, crammed into a space the size of a phone booth. The water that sputters out is gray at first, then relatively clear. Lukewarm, but that's better than ice cold.

I shower quickly because I can already hear doors creaking and slamming as several other roommates roll out of bed. Frank's coffee is burning in the

downstairs kitchen. Smells like his toast might be, too.

Artists are not known for rising early, but none of us are successful enough to avoid the shackles of a side job. I've got three.

This morning I'm working a brunch shift, and later I'll be taking four unruly canines for a run in the park.

I slam my hip against the bathroom door to force it open again, the steam-swollen wood jammed into the frame. I almost collide with Joanna, who's heading downstairs in an oversized t-shirt, nothing underneath.

"Mara," she says, her face already screwing up in apology. "I can't sublet my studio to you anymore—my residency at La Maison is over."

"Starting when?" I ask, panic boiling in my guts.

"Next week." She grimaces.

"Alright," I say. "Thanks for letting me know."

It is not alright. Not even fucking close to alright.

Studio space is impossible to acquire at the moment. Studio after studio has closed as the rent in San Francisco skyrockets.

Growing up, this was an artists' city. Clarion Alley, the Mission School, and wild, chaotic underground art burgeoned everywhere you looked.

My mother wasn't an artist per se, but she liked to fuck a lot of them. We crashed on couches and in little flats above steamy restaurants in Chinatown. Every day I saw grandiose murals being painted, pop-up installations and performance art breaking out on the street.

My life with my mother was chaotic and miserable, but I saw beautiful things created all around me. It gave me hope that loveliness could bloom out of ugliness and scarcity.

Now it feels like a plug has been pulled. All the artists are draining away, fleeing to Oakland or Portland or even L.A. where they can at least find commercial work.

The spaces they rented are snapped up by tech companies and software millionaires who gut the historic buildings, filling their wood frames with gleaming glass and steel.

Logically I know I have no right to hold on to any of it—I own nothing myself. I’ve barely got eighty dollars in my bank account.

But it makes me so bitter to see it all disappear right when I’m finally old enough to take part.

I dress in my work clothes, which are just cut-off jean shorts, athletic socks, and converse sneakers. So far I’ve successfully avoided any job with a dress code.

I plop down at our rickety breakfast table, canvassing Frank, Heinrich, and Erin to see if anyone knows of affordable studio space.

“Not me,” Heinrich says glumly. “I’m looking myself.”

Heinrich always finds studio space hard to come by because his work is based around electrical illumination. He requires torches and soldering equipment, and he’s set at least one place on fire before.

“You could try applying to the Minnesota Street Project,” Erin says.

“Good fucking luck,” Heinrich scoffs. “They’ve got a hundred applicants for every space.”

None of this is improving my mood. I gulp down some of Frank’s awful coffee while forgoing the toast. We’ve got fresh croissants at work. My boss Arthur never minds if I steal a few.

“Mara,” Erin says. “You owe me twenty-eight dollars for utilities.”

Internally groaning, I dig in my pocket and pull out the twenty-dollar bill I was hoping to use for groceries.

“I’ll get you the other eight dollars after work,” I promise.

I’ve never known what it would be like to swipe a card without wondering if the balance would clear. I’m on some kind of hamster wheel where the faster I scramble to earn money, the faster the ground slips away beneath me.

On the other hand, I've never starved yet.

I run to Sweet Maple, showing up sweating and puffing, the effects of the shower already obliterated. Arthur shoves an apron at me, saying, "Move your ass, I just sat three tables on the sidewalk."

San Franciscans' commitment to eating outdoors even in the shittiest weather will never cease to impress me. We've got heat lamps and umbrellas for the chilliest days, but I don't think anything short of a direct lightning strike would keep our diners away.

Granted, we've also got the best goddamn brunch in the city. I carry out heaping plates of asparagus omelets, crab benedicts, and our famous bacon until my arms are shaking.

Whenever I see anybody I know, I sneak them free mimosas. Arthur doesn't mind that either—he may be rude and overbearing, but he's a sweetheart to the core, and this is his way of supporting the community.

When Arthur finally lets me go, a much-needed seventy-two dollars in tips stuffed in my pocket, I'm sprinting to pick up the dogs on time.

I brought my skates in my backpack. I take the dogs all around Golden Gate Park, letting them pull me along, only working on the uphill stretches.

Bruno is being a shithead as usual, trying to tangle the leashes. I rub my knuckles across his thick skull to remind him we're friends. He's an oversized mastiff, too big for the little apartment in which he resides. I don't think his owner ever takes him out beyond our excursions.

The dogs make me happy because *they're* happy. They've got their tongues out, scenting the peppery eucalyptus in the air. I breathe it in too, closing my eyes so I can taste it in my lungs.

I'm thinking about the piece I'm working on in Joanna's studio, wondering if I can finish it before I'm kicked out of her space. It's too big to move easily. If I could get it into the New Voices show, that would be something . . .

Something pretty fucking unlikely.

God, I wish I could sell something.

Erin sold a painting for eight hundred dollars last month. Covered almost all her rent. What a dream that would be.

I think about the showcase a few weeks back. Alastor Shaw won a ten-thousand-dollar prize. Now *that's* a fucking dream. I could practically live a year off that.

I wasn't there when they announced the winner—I had to leave early to hit my third job, bartending at Zam Zam.

I had seen Shaw standing by his piece—a technicolor painting that practically seared the eyeballs. Erin whispered to me that she was going to go talk to him.

“He’s so fucking hot,” she murmured. “Look at that body . . .”

I thought he looked like he should be rowing crew for Yale in 1952. He had that square-jawed, sun-kissed, excessively healthy look, with just a dash of misogyny. Handsome, sure, but not my type.

While I liked his piece, I thought Cole Blackwell should have won. His sculpture had a pale, haunting quality that captivated me, floating in space like a wraith.

Everybody knows about Blackwell and Shaw’s rivalry. The art mags love writing up every little tiff between them. Both young, loaded, and fucking everything that moves, all while trying to top each other with increasingly outrageous artwork—it’s a columnist’s wet dream.

I’ve never actually seen Blackwell. Erin says he’s moody and standoffish. Sometimes he skips his own shows.

We might cross paths tonight—supposedly he’s showing at Oasis. Erin is dragging me along because she did indeed chat up Shaw at the last event, and she’s hoping tonight will turn into something a whole lot steamier.

She’ll have to get in line. As far as I can tell, taking a ride on Alastor Shaw is about as “exclusive” as his endless runs of “limited edition” prints.



ONCE I'VE DROPPED the dogs off back at their respective houses, I hurry over to Joanna's studio in Eureka Valley. There I spend the next six hours deeply immersed in my collage.

I haven't decided what medium I'll work in consistently. Sometimes I paint, and sometimes I craft objects that require immense concentration and an insane number of hours. This is not at all a profitable way to make art—you cannot spend two hundred hours on a tiny, beaded teacup that no one wants to buy. But I'm addicted to the sensation of minute, repetitive, and even torturous activity.

Occasionally I take photographs on an ancient Pentacoon. I would not consider that my best work. I use the camera only when I want to capture a moment in time, something that actually happened.

Not knowing what sort of artist I'll be makes me feel unformed and amateurish. As if I'm a child playing dress-up; my paint-spattered overalls become cosplay.

Other times I think how I've poured every spare cent I ever had into raw materials, and how almost all the free hours of my life have been spent on art, and then I think if that doesn't make me an artist, then nothing does.

In those moments I experience a burning righteousness that makes me hate people like Cole Blackwell despite never having met him, because he's always been rich and probably has never sacrificed a day in his life.

The Blackwells are an old San Francisco family. His ancestors probably made their money on the gold fields, or more likely, selling something to those hapless miners. That's always where the real profit lies.

Once I've been working long enough, I no longer think about Blackwell, or anybody else. I don't think about the fact that I'm about to lose this cramped but highly useful space, and that I don't have enough shifts lined up to make my next rent payment.

All those buzzing thoughts melt away like wet candy floss, and all the other sensory inputs that prick and poke at me likewise disappear. I don't hear the humming of the halogen lights or the irregular rushing of traffic outside the window. I'm no longer bothered by the slice of sunshine that cuts across the



room, overheating the back of my arm.

I listen to music on my headphones while sinking into the pod.

The pod is a state of perfect concentration.

It's my nirvana, my state of meditative bliss.

Nothing can bother me there. Nothing can upset me.

In the pod, I'm my truest self. Alone. Utterly at peace.

I'm so deeply immersed that I don't notice that I'm extremely late to meet Erin until she calls my phone for the third or fourth time.

"Fuck, I'm sorry," I say, by way of greeting.

"I left without you," she informs me. "You should get over here. Cole Blackwell made this gorgeous gold sculpture, everybody's freaking the fuck out, it sold for a boatload of cash before the show was even over."

I check my watch.

I've missed most of the show—but if I hurry, I could still make it for half an hour at least. Shows never end on time. The organizers get as tipsy as everybody else, sometimes staying for hours afterward, talking and polishing off the drinks.

My stomach growls, reminding me that all I've eaten so far today was a croissant. God, I hope I didn't miss the snacks—parties and shows subsidize half my grocery budget.

I don't have time to change clothes. Remembering that Joanna keeps a couple things stashed in the coat closet, I dig out a 90s-style crushed velvet dress, wrinkled and smelling of turpentine.

Then I hop a streetcar to the gallery. The floor-to-ceiling windows illuminate the street like the whole building is one vast, glowing lamp. Music bursts out the doors when anyone enters or exits.

I slip inside, immediately enveloped by the hubbub of laughter and conversation. You never feel out of place at an art event because everybody is dressed so eccentrically. I'm surrounded by every type of attire, from

brocade suits to raggedy jeans.

I don't have to ask Erin where to find Blackwell's piece—it glows on its plinth like a collection of celestial bodies rotating in space.

I stand in awe of this beautiful thing, hitting me like an arrow shaft to the chest, filling me with a helpless sense of longing.

I wonder if I'll ever create anything this good.

After I've goggled at it for a good twenty minutes, my snarling stomach finally pulls me away.

Sadly, the buffet table bears only a few scattered grape stems and a couple of cheese rinds.

“The hyenas picked it over,” a gruff male voice says.

I turn around, beholding the ox-like frame of Alastor Shaw, his broad face devoid of its usual smile.

I might like him better this way. I've never been a fan of people who smile too much. It feels like they're trying to force you to smile back at them, which makes my face tired.

“That's what I get for being late.” I shrug.

“What's your name?” he asks. “I haven't seen you around before.”

We've crossed paths several times, but I wouldn't expect him to remember.

“Mara Eldritch,” I say.

“Alastor Shaw,” he replies, holding out his hand.

I take it, feeling his thick, calloused fingers close around mine.

“Yeah,” I laugh. “I know.”

He grins back at me, sheepish, friendly crinkles at the corners of his eyes. “Well, it never seems to get me a table anywhere good,” he says.

“It might get you a free mimosa at Sweet Maple,” I say. “My boss is a big fan of yours.”

“Yeah? Let me guess, he’s forty and balding?” Alastor says wryly.

“Sixty and bald,” I confirm.

“I’m never the favorite of the ones I’d like to impress,” Alastor says, leaning against the buffet table so his muscular forearm makes brief contact with my hip. He hasn’t broken eye contact.

“I don’t believe that for a second,” I say.

“Oh no?” Now he’s leaning in all the more. “What would I have to do to—”

At that moment, Erin inserts herself neatly between us, pretending not to notice Alastor, saying brightly, “There you are! I thought you weren’t going to make it?”

She gives me a hidden prod with her elbow.

“This is my roommate, Erin,” I tell Alastor.

“Right—we met at the showcase,” Alastor says. He’s still smiling, but I think I see a flicker of irritation on his face.

Erin doesn’t notice, probably because she’s not used to men eluding her advances. Her sleepy smile and luscious body have a near-perfect record of attracting her quarry.

“You offered me a tour of your studio,” Erin says, peering up at Alastor from under her long lashes. “But we never exchanged numbers . . .”

“I’ve gotta pee,” I say, slipping away from the pair of them.

I didn’t need Erin’s elbow to the ribs to remind me that she has dibs on Alastor. I wouldn’t need it either way—I’ve never dated anybody famous and successful, and I’m probably not secure enough to handle it. Not that Alastor seems like he’s much for dating.

For what he wants, I’m sure Erin will suffice just as well as me—probably better. I like sex but I’m not that great at it. I’m too easily irritated. If a guy eats a slice of pizza and then tries to kiss me, if he makes a clicking sound when he swallows, if a hangnail scratches my skin, if he even fucking thinks about kissing my ears, my pussy clamps shut like a bear trap.

I wander the rest of the galleries, trying to recapture that transcendent feeling I experienced looking at Blackwell's work. Nothing else hits me quite as hard, so I circle back around to take another look at it.

The small placard reads, *Fragile Ego*.

I wonder what that means. Blackwell's work is rarely self-referential.

I chat with a couple other people I know before sneaking out back of the gallery to take a hit off Frank's vape pen.

It's beginning to rain again, a light drizzle that barely dampens us any more than the usual fog. The droplets condense in Frank's tight curls like tiny gemstones, and the smoke curls around his face with every exhale until he looks like Zeus with a beard made of clouds.

"I wish I had my camera," I laugh. "You look incredible right now."

"You're high," Frank laughs back at me. "I've looked like shit all week."

Frank's boyfriend broke up with him. He's been miserable ever since.

"You want another hit?" he asks, holding out the vape.

"Nah," I say.

Weed hits me hard. I can already feel that loose warmth working on my body and my sense of time. I'm no longer sure how long we've been standing out here. Only that Joanna's velvet dress is heavy with moisture.

"Some of us are gonna grab drinks at Zam Zam," Frank says. "You wanna come?"

"I've got to work early," I say.

The Sunday morning brunch shift is insane. Arthur won't thank me if I'm late tomorrow.

"See ya, then," Frank says, leaning back against the brick wall to take another puff.

I head off along the tree-lined street, wondering if Erin and Shaw are on their way back to his studio yet. Or straight to his apartment. I'm sure I'll hear all

the gory details in the morning.

The route back to my house isn't particularly well-lit.

The bodega on the corner sends out a bright beacon of light, but the thickness of the laurels, the tall row houses, and the narrow, winding streets obscure the sparse streetlamps.

I'd like to put my headphones on while I walk, but I think the better of it, even though I probably look too poor for mugging.

Instead, I examine the facades of the houses I pass, the brightly painted scrollwork and well-tended window boxes giving way to chipped paint, rusted railings, and sagging steps as I draw closer to my own ramshackle house.

Gritty footsteps sound behind me.

Out of the corner of my eye, I spy some large, dark mass hurtling toward me.

I barely have time to turn before I'm struck across the back of the skull.



I WAKE in the trunk of a car.

I can tell it's a trunk from the vibration of the engine, the smell of gasoline, and the centrifugal lurch that presses me against the tire wheel when the vehicle takes a hard left turn.

I can't see anything because of the bag over my head.

Thick, black fabric presses against my face, sucking into my nostrils with every panicked breath. I shake my head wildly, trying to fling it off, but it's cinched around my neck. Tape covers my mouth so tightly that I can't even rip my lips apart.

My arms are bound behind my back with some thin, plasticky material—zip ties? My ankles are bound in the same way, my knees bent, the two points of contact wrenched together in a hog-tie so I can't even kick.

The position is excruciating. My fingers and toes are so numb that for a moment I'm afraid they're not even attached anymore.

I can't get enough air. The smothering hood, the sealed trunk, the tape, the gasoline fumes . . . I'm panting faster and faster through my nostrils, head swimming. My stomach lurches, and I know that whatever else happens, I absolutely cannot allow myself to puke. With the tape over my mouth, I'll aspirate the vomit.

Everything in me wants to scream, but I fight that urge just as hard. I don't want this motherfucker to know I'm awake.

My head is pounding. I'm sure if I could reach up and feel the back of my skull, I'd find a lump the size of a baseball.

*Where is he taking me?*

*Who the fuck is this?*

I don't bother to ask myself what he's gonna do to me. I'm already riding the thin edge of hysteria—I don't want to tip over the edge with visions of what this psychopath has planned.

I have to get out of the trunk. A tumble out of a moving car is the least of my worries right now.

I squirm around, feeling for the hidden latch that's supposed to be inside every trunk. My numb fingers can barely differentiate between the rough material of the lining and the metal lid.

I want to cry. I want to scream. I want to puke.

These impulses cycle over and over, each one harder to crush than the last.

The car slows and my heart rate spikes.

*No, no, no, no, no!*

I don't want to get wherever we're going.

I scrabble madly for the latch, still finding nothing.

The car rolls to a gentle stop.

WHERE'S THE FUCKING LATCH!

I hear the engine shutting off, and the driver's side door creaking open.

Too late.

Footsteps circle round to the trunk—slow and widely spaced.

Fighting every impulse within me, I lay perfectly still within the trunk. I want him to think I'm still unconscious.

It takes everything I have not to flinch or struggle as he puts his arms under my body and lifts me out.

It's only when the cold air hits my flesh that I realize I'm naked—or at least, partly naked. My tits are definitely bare.

The sense of violation is almost enough to make me crack. To say nothing of the agony of being carried in this contorted position.

He walks along at that same steady, measured pace.

I can feel his heart beating against my shoulder, like a creature inside his chest, pulsing, and swelling. I hate the intimate feel of it thudding away. I hate even more his sour breath against my bare flesh.

This can't be happening. It's too surreal. I can't be one of those girls raped and murdered in the woods. Nothing exceptional has ever happened to me. The irony that this could be my one claim to fame is too much to bear.

Without warning, he dumps me on the ground.

I fall like a sack of potatoes, unable to put up my hands to protect myself, chin slamming against the dirt. The air wheezes out of my lungs and I taste blood in my mouth.

“I know you’re awake,” a male voice says.

The voice is utterly flat. The lack of emotion makes it sound almost robotic. I can’t tell how old he is, or if there’s any hint of an accent.

I can’t answer him because of the tape over my mouth. I can’t see him either—the hood is so thick that no light passes through. I know we’re outdoors from the sound of his shoes on the rough ground, and the dirt and pebbles beneath my bare skin. But I have no idea if we’re still in the city or hours from civilization.

I hear him crouch next to me, knees popping.

My tits are on fire, the cold metal fixed in place no matter how I squirm. It’s so much worse that I can’t see what he’s done—I can only imagine.

I tried so hard to maintain control.

It’s all splintering away.

I’m rolling and wrenching against the ties, thrashing helplessly, howling against the tape. I’m raging, screaming, though hardly any sound leaks out. The hood is wet with tears.



He's standing there watching me, the way you'd watch a worm twitching. I can't see, but I know it's true.

If I could see his face, I'd find no pity there. No hint of humanity.

I scream harder, flail harder, knowing it's all for nothing. I can't do anything to help myself.

I'm about to die, and there's nothing I can do to stop it.

My life has been a fucking disaster at times, but I wanted to keep it. I always believed it would get better.

I guess I was wrong.

"One more thing," the man says, turning me over on my side, his heavy hand gripping my shoulder.

"GRAHHHHH!" I scream against the tape.

A vicious slash burns across each arm as he slits my wrists.





## COLE

**I**t takes several weeks for the rumors of Carl Danvers' disappearance to begin swirling around the art world.

I'm sure the Siren office reported his failure to arrive at work.

Maybe the cops even visited his pretentious apartment in Pacific Heights. They won't find anything there.

I've already heard whispers that he was deeply in debt, that he was depressed, that he once made a joke about throwing himself off a bridge.

Nobody's saying the word "dead."

That's the thing about murder: no body, no crime.

It's devilishly difficult to prove that someone is dead if they simply disappear.

I've made every trace of Danvers vanish.

The last of him resides in the industrial bin I brought out to the mine. I doused it all in bleach. Not just any bleach—highly concentrated oxygen-producing detergent. It causes hemoglobin to degrade, destroying the ability to harvest DNA.

I dropped the bin down a three-hundred-foot deep shaft, hidden inside a cave. There are 47,000 abandoned mines in California, nine hundred just in the Bay Area.

I doubt my dumping ground will ever be discovered. If it is, the remains I've deposited are unlikely to be identified, and impossible to link to me.

I felt deeply peaceful as the bin disappeared down the shaft.

I'm hollowed out, cleansed, ready to rest.

The night is misty and cold. I've never seen another soul within a dozen miles of this place. The bare ground looks blue and ink-soaked, like an alien planet.

Not alien to me. I know every foot of ground, which is why the bundle deposited on the path catches my attention like a flaming neon sign.

There was no bundle when I walked this way before. No cars parked anywhere along the road leading up to the trail.

Instantly my eyes dilate, my nostrils flare. I listen for the slightest sound of movement, of someone close by. Every blade of grass, every pebble, stands out in acute detail.

## COLE

I take my stalking of Mara online.

They're an artsy bunch, so the photos they share are more eclectic than average. I have to wade through any number of sepia-toned popcorn machines, pictures of people's feet, and landscape shots to find something useful. Once I do, I find endless portraits of Mara.

Mara is popular for this purpose because—despite not being as sexy as her roommate Erin—she has that stark bone structure that captures well on film.

I intend to choose the time and location of that meeting. I'll control all the elements, arranging the players like pieces on a chessboard.

I desire to see Mara again, to speak to her. I want to manipulate her and see how she reacts.

And if I want something . . . that means it's good.



I BREAK into her room later that afternoon.

She's walking a half-dozen dogs in Golden Gate Park, something that usually takes her several hours with the pick-up and drop-off process.

It's almost impossible to find a point in the day where none of her roommates are home, so I don't bother waiting. The house is so crowded, with so many people coming and going, I doubt that any of them will notice a few extra creaks from a room that ought to be empty.

It helps that Mara's room is on the topmost floor. It's easy to scale the trellis of the neighboring house, drop down onto her deck, and force open the flimsy lock on the glass door.

The attic room is certainly not to code. The ceiling is so low that I can't stand upright, even in the center of the peaked space. Mara's bed is a futon mattress on the floor, her clothes folded in plastic milk crates because she has no closet or dresser.

Most of the drawings are figure studies. She has a good sense of proportion, and she's skilled at indicating the direction of the light. Perhaps because most of the subjects are her friends, she's caught a strong sense of personality in their positions, in the expression of their faces. The tall black girl, Joanna, looks awkward but pleased at being drawn. The boy with frizzy curls seems to be holding back a laugh.

With no place to sit, I sink down on Mara's pathetic mattress. The bed is unmade, her blanket in a crumpled pile.

I flip through several of her books. *Naked Lunch*, *The Virgin Suicides*, *Life After Life*, *Troubled Blood*, *Black Swan Green*, *Lolita*, *Cold Spring Harbor*, *Winter's Bone*, *The Cement Garden* . . .

Butterflied next to the bed is *Dracula*. I pick it up, seeing that she's drawn all over the pages, marking passages and writing notes.

She's underlined:

*EVEN IF SHE be not harmed, her heart may fail her in so much and so many horrors; and hereafter she may suffer—both in waking, from her nerves, and in sleep, from her dreams . . .”*

I SMILE TO MYSELF.

Poor little Mara is not impervious to nightmares, whatever she may pretend during the daylight hours.

I pick up the next novel on the stack, *Prometheus Illbound*, and let it fall open to a dog-eared page. Here she's marked:

*I DO NOT LOVE MEN: I love what devours them.*

THAT ACTUALLY MAKES ME LAUGH. I haven't laughed in some time.

I set the books down.

I can smell Mara's perfume on her sheets, stronger than when I followed her.

I lay down in her bed, my head on her pillow. I turn my face so my nose is pressed against her crumpled sheets and I inhale.

Her scent is layered and complex. Warm notes of vanilla, caramel. A botanical scent—mandarin, or maybe black currant. Then something exotic,

spiced—perhaps a jasmine soap. Under that, the light scent of her sweat, which arouses me far more than any of the others. My cock swells until it's no longer comfortable within my trousers.

I enjoy the trespass of laying in her bed. Knowing that she may catch a hint of my cologne lingering there tonight. It may confuse or frighten her. Or arouse her, if my chemical composition calls to her as hers does to me.

I hurry into the house, knowing Josh will be annoyed if I'm late again.

Joanna passes me on the stairs, likewise hurrying to a date with her long-term boyfriend Paul, as I jog up the three flights to my attic room.

I laugh. "Don't worry, I'm about to change."

I strip off my clothes, sweaty from skating around the park with the dogs. Even though we're well into October and the sky was cloudy, it was close to eighty degrees, muggy and humid.

I consider rinsing off in the shower, but I don't really have time. Instead, I pull a black mini dress out of the closet, along with pair of suede boots.

JOSH IS irritated it took me so long to arrive.

“I’ve been sitting here twenty minutes with this drink!” he says. “The waitress is pissed.”

Our waitress is leaning up against a pillar, flirting with the busboy.

“I know,” I snap. “That’s why I work here. It’s the literal best brunch in the city.”

“Is that really why you work here?” Cole asks, watching me closely.

“Yes. The smell of food—I can’t stand it if it’s not good. The food here smells incredible because it *is* incredible. Here, try this now—take a sip of the mimosa, then eat one of the spicy-sweet potatoes.”

Cole does exactly what I said, taking a small sip of his drink, then quickly biting into the potato.

“What the fuck,” he says. “Why is that so good?”

“I dunno.” I shrug. “Something about the sour citrus and then the pop of salt. They amplify each other.”

Cole is watching me as I eat my own food, taking a small bite of one thing and then another, cycling through my favorite combinations.

“Is that how you eat?” he says.

I shrug. “Unless I’m in a hurry.”

“Show me more combinations.”

I show him all my favorite ways to eat the magnificent brunch spread Arthur laid before us—lemon curd layered with fresh strawberries and clotted cream on the scones, blueberries between bites of maple bacon, a dash of hot sauce mixed in with the hollandaise . . .

Cole tries it all with an unusual level of curiosity. I'd assume somebody as rich as him has eaten at a million fancy restaurants.

"Don't you eat out all the time?" I ask him.

He shakes his head. "I don't spend much time on food. It bores me."

"But you like this?"

"I do," he says, almost as if he hates to admit it. "How do you come up with all this?"

I shrug. "When I was little, we never had fresh groceries. Dinner was whatever I could scrounge from the kitchen without mold growing on it. A can of corn. Boiled egg. Dry cereal. I never tried most foods until I started working at restaurants. I'd never tasted steak, or cilantro, or avocado. I wanted to try everything—it was like discovering a whole new sense."

"But there was a time when you weren't poor," Cole says, harrying that point like a dog with a bone. He's really not gonna fucking drop it.

"Yes," I say testily. "When we lived with Randall."

"That's your stepfather."

"Yes."

"What did you eat then?"

"Not fucking much. He used to scream at me if my spoon clinked in my cereal bowl."

"How old were you?"

"Eleven."

"He didn't like having a stepkid?"

"No. He didn't. And by that point, he had learned a thing or two about my mother. She's very good at fooling people for a while. By the time he realized, they were already married."

I LEAVE brunch in a kind of a daze, wondering how in the fuck Cole Blackwell now knows more about my sordid history than my closest friends. **T**his obsession with Mara consumes me.  
It's all I think about. It directs every action I take.

I've never felt so out of control—which upsets me.

My fantasies have always been a stage spread below me, on which I arrange the actors like a director. I indulge them at will.

Now I find myself fantasizing about Mara, with no intent or control. Without even realizing I'm about to slip into another daydream more real than the world around me.

I see every element of her face, her body . . .

When I first laid eyes on her, I barely found her tolerable. In fact, her bitten nails and air of obvious neglect disgusted me.

But now, some bizarre alchemy is working itself upon me. Every element of her person becomes increasingly attractive to me. The slimness of her figure and the dreamy way it moves when she's lost in thought. Those elegant hands that seem to enact the most clever impulses of her brain with no barrier in between. The mix of innocence and wildness in her face—and that expression of rebellion that creases her eyebrows, that raises her upper lip, baring her teeth.

She's determined to defy me at every turn, even though it's obvious I'm infinitely more powerful than her. She's stubborn. Self-destructive, even.

And yet she's not some pathetic, broken victim. Her will to live, to thrive, to never, ever, ever give up in her relentless pursuit of her goals . . .

I've never seen myself in another person before.

Much as Shaw desperately wants to believe that we are one and the same, I've never felt a kinship with him. Very much the opposite.

There is only one god in my world. I was alone in the universe.

And now I see . . . a spark.

A spark that interests me.

I want to hold it in my hands. Manipulate it. Examine it.

Mara has a kind of power separate from my own. I want to know if I can harness it. Or consume it.

I visit her studio regularly. I don't knock—she knows I'm watching her through the camera mounted above her door. There is no appearance of privacy.

I walk into the studio I own, that I supply to her, and I see the rebellious ways she's altered the space—how she's somehow managed to throw open the high upper windows, how she's scattered her clothes and books around, and used an injudicious amount of her grant money to fill the space with plants—leafy tropicals, vine-like hanging baskets, and potted trees to supplement the ornamental lemons already in place. She's taken my carefully curated English garden and turned it into a jungle.

Mara's appearance ranges from homeless to deranged—torn overalls, bare feet, paint-streaked face and hands, brushes thrust into her hair for safekeeping.

I examine every millimeter of it.

"The hands need work," I say.

"I know," Mara says. "The nails . . ."

“This edge could be sharpened.” I point the handle of a paintbrush toward the figure’s left shoulder. “Here.”

I take the palette from its resting place and dip the brush, intending to darken the edge myself.

“NO!” Mara snaps, as I raise the brush toward the canvas. “I’ll do it.”

I set the palette down, narrowing my eyes at her. “You should be so fucking lucky as to have it known I touched my brush to your work.”

“Yes,” she says. “I’m aware of your many talents. You can paint rings around me. I don’t give a shit—nobody touches this canvas but me.”

She faces me down, physically blocking me from the canvas, eyes wild, paintbrush gripped like she wants to shank me.

She’s so passionate about everything.

“You look like you want to stab me,” I say. “Have you ever hurt anyone, Mara? Or only imagined it . . .”

Her fist trembles, clenched around the brush.

That’s not a tremble of fear.

It’s rage.

*At who, Mara? Me? Alastor Shaw? The mother, the stepfather? Or the whole fucking world . . .*

“I’ve never hurt anyone,” she says. “And I don’t want to.”

“You don’t wish anyone ill?”

“No.”

“What about the man who kidnapped you?” I’ve stepped close to her now, looking down at her. “What about him?”

Her chest rises and falls, faster and faster, yet she refuses to take a step back.

“You must want revenge. He tied you up. Pierced your nipples.”

I look down at her chest. Mara never wears a bra. Her small breasts and pert little nipples are regularly visible beneath the thin material of her crop tops and dresses. All the more so because of the silver rings through those nipples that she has yet to remove.

“Why haven’t you taken those out, Mara? I think I know why . . .”

She looks up at me, those wide, wild eyes on either side of that impudent nose and vicious little mouth . . .

“Why?” she demands.

“As a reminder. You don’t want to forget. Which means you don’t want to forgive.”

Her pupils expand like a drop of oil spreading on water.

I’m speaking the thoughts right out of her brain.

“He cut your wrists. Left you for dead. No . . . worse than that. Left you as a mockery. A fucking joke. He didn’t even finish killing you, that’s how little you meant to him. He didn’t even stay to watch you die.”

The truth is that Alastor didn’t linger because he knew he couldn’t conceal himself from me.

But I’m telling Mara what she knows to be true . . . the man who attacked her sees her as less than garbage. Less than dirt. An insect, struggling and dying on the windowsill, not even worthy of his notice.

“You would hurt him, Mara. You want to hurt him. He deserves it. If no one stops him, he’ll *keep* hurting people. It would be more than justice . . . it would be *good*.”

Mara faces me, eyes blazing, face flushed.

A righteous angel in the face of a demon.

"What if he *wasn't* helpless? What if it was him, or you?"

*She still thinks it might have been me.*

She thinks I did that to her.

And yet she's here, now, alone in this room with me, inches apart, her lips as swollen and flushed as mine . . .

*She's more twisted than I ever dared dream.*







## MARA

**T**he night of New Voices I'm so nervous that I vomit in the gutter on the way to the show.

Cole said he'd send a car for me at 9:00.

At 8:20 I left on foot.

I've come to know Cole Blackwell more intimately than I would ever have imagined these last few weeks. I honestly think I might know him better than any person in this city, because it's only around me that he lets the mask fall. And it's not one mask—it's dozens.

I watch him lift each to his face, one after another, each tailor-made for the person with whom he converses.

The mask for my boss Arthur is that of a fellow businessman with an emotional attachment to his young protégé—in Cole's case, tinged with an all-too apparent romanticism.

The mask he wears around most of his employees is of a distant, autocratic artist. He has them jumping at his wild demands, all the while making just enough outlandish requests to disguise what he actually wants . . .

The mask he wears for Sonia is the most fucked up of all because it *appears* the most intimate. Around her, he shows his ruthlessness and wicked humor. He'll even admit unflattering things to her. But then he turns to me, and I see the animation fall from his face, revealing the absolute blankness beneath. A

sight Sonia has never glimpsed, not even for a fraction of a second. He's too careful. He never slips.

Everything he does is deliberate and flawless.

I'm not so fucking stupid that I don't realize he could also be using a mask on me. The most deceptive of all, because it most approximates reality.

He knows how good I am at spotting irregularities. I'm jumpy, sensitive—tiny details are glaring sirens to me. He knows this one has to be good. A real work of art. Otherwise, it won't fool me.

All of this is to say, I *have* been watching Cole just as closely as he watches me. I watch while he mentors and instructs me, ripping my painting to shreds and demanding that I work and re-work it, laboring constantly, continuously, perfecting it for the show. And he's right, that's what fucking kills me, he's right! The things he points out, the things he tells me to change, I see them too. I know what I have to do.

We both see the painting as it WILL be. As it HAS to be.

We see the perfect vision.

The closer it gets to perfect, the tighter Cole slips his noose around me. He thinks he has me tied up, completely under his control: in his studio, in his show, publicly known as his protégé.

He's getting bossier by the day. Trying to take more and more of my time. Showing up outside my work, knowing when my shift is over, walking me to his studio. Taking me home again at night. Making sure I never go anywhere outside his sight, without him knowing.

I see what he's doing.

He's planning to pick me up in that limo tonight, already dressed for the evening, him in whatever he's picked out for himself and me in the dress a courier brought over this morning: a stunning silk gown, slit to the navel. Elegant and dangerous. Something that would have turned every head in the gallery.

Well fuck him, I pick out my own clothes.

And nobody is gonna look at me tonight because of a low-cut dress. They're going to stare at the painting. Because the painting is fucking gorgeous.

I stomp over to the gallery, wearing a 70s mini dress and my favorite boots.

I get there a half hour early instead of fashionably late. I could have strolled in on Cole Blackwell's arm. Instead, I'm going to see peoples' reactions to my work. Their REAL reaction, when they don't know I'm here.

The half-moon of people around the canvas stand quietly like worshippers.

The painting is lit as all paintings of saints should be: by one, single, brilliant overhead light.

The figure's face is upturned to that light, her body positioned in a way that is simultaneously elegant and broken, contorted and free.

She is pierced through with knives, arrows, bullets, boards . . . a stone has caved in half her skull. Her pale flesh strains against the leather harness, smooth as alabaster stone.

Yet her expression is ecstatic. Beatific. Grateful, even.

The title reads, *The Mercy of Men*.

The painting is exactly life-size. It's hung as if you could step right through the canvas and take her place in the frame.

The new critic for the Siren points at the figure's face.

A perfect portrait.

My portrait.

"Who the fuck is that?" she says.

**M**y rage upon arriving at Mara's house and finding her already gone is only surpassed by my disgust at myself for not anticipating this.

I had been counting on her understanding of how advantageous it would be to arrive together. Cameras flashing as we stepped out of the limousine, each oozing the glamour, wealth, and cache I had carefully curated for that moment.

I HATE when she walks.

Cole looks down at me, our faces only inches apart. He's paler than usual, dark circles under his eyes. He definitely wasn't asleep. He might not have slept last night either.

It must be raining outside. His clothes are damp. Droplets glint in his thick, black hair, the tips wet like my brush.

“Don’t worry,” he says. “I’ve been practicing the last few hours.”

“On who?!”

He just smiles.

“Steady now. I’m still perfecting my technique.”

Cole cleans my skin with green soap, also taken from the bag. He really has everything he needs in there.

“DON’T YOU FUCKING DARE—”

He fires up the gun with that high buzzing sound that’s all too familiar to me.

I shriek, trying to twist away from him.

“If you don’t hold still, you won’t like the result,” he says.

He presses the tip of the gun against my ribs, turning my shriek into a piercing scream.

I feel the prick of the needle as it pierces my skin, depositing the ink deep down where it can never be removed.

Instinctively, I freeze.

I can't stop Cole. And I really don't want a fucking mess all over my ribs.

The gun moves slowly, surely. Though I know a tattoo gun operates much like a sewing machine, plunging the needle down under the skin at regular intervals, what it actually feels like is someone drawing on you with a sharp pen.

I look down, trying to figure out what he's drawing.

It's impossible to tell from this angle, upside down.

Cole's hands move over me, strong and capable. Warmer than I would have guessed. In fact, his bare hands on my flesh feel surprisingly pleasurable, in contrast to the bite of the needle.

I want to say it.

His hand is stroking, rubbing, exactly the way I like. Better than a man has ever managed before. Better than I can do it myself . . .

"SAY IT," he snarls.

"No fucking way," I hiss back at him.

He finishes the tattoo with a vicious slash down the bone.



I shriek. Every muscle of my body tenses, including my thighs clamping hard together. That's what makes me cum, as much as Cole's fingers pressed against my clit. The orgasm is a blazing shock that rips through me from chest to groin, in one continuous loop.

A dozen more people are shouting for me all down the bar, and I don't really have time for stupid jokes.

"What's your rush?" the first guy says. "We're tipping you, aren't we?"

He throws a handful of crumpled bills at me, mostly ones. Half the bills land in my ice well, which really pisses me off because money is filthy—I'm gonna have to dump that ice and fill the well up fresh.

"Thanks," I say, weighting that word with about ten pounds of sarcasm.

"Fuck you, bitch," the second guy sneers.

I look him up and down. "Nah. I don't do charity work."

It takes him a second to get it, but his friends' howls tip him off that it's definitely an insult.

I've already turned away, so I don't hear whatever he shouts back at me.

I dump the ice and run to the back to grab a fresh batch. I'm hoping by the time I get back, those idiots will have found somewhere else to congregate. Unfortunately, when I return, puffing and sweating under the weight of the

ice bin, they're still clustered in the same spot. Mr. Blue Polo Shirt glowers at me.

I pour the ice into the well, pointedly ignoring him. Then I turn to set down the empty bin.

The moment I bend over, I feel a sharp slap on my ass. I wheel around, catching Blue Shirt on top of the bar.

**W**ith all the time I've been spending watching Mara, I've barely been paying attention to my own work.

Marcus York rings me up to "remind me" to submit my design for the sculpture in Corona Heights Park.

"Alastor Shaw sent me his early sketches," York says, trying to stoke my competitive fire. "They were pretty impressive . . . but I'm sure you've got something even better percolating in that brain."

Actually, I don't.

I'm not uninterested in the project. It would be the largest piece I've ever done, which makes my mind run wild. However, this is one sculpture I won't be able to build alone. I'm not sure how much I'd enjoy designing something I couldn't manufacture myself.

Erin is going as Poison Ivy, so she's been sewing hundreds of tiny artificial leaves all over a fabulous disco jumpsuit. Over the years, she's dressed up as practically every famous redhead in history: Lucille Ball, Jessica Rabbit, Ariel, Wilma Flintstone . . . I think my favorite was Joan from *Mad Men*, because only Erin has the curves to truly pull that off.

I've been hand-painting tiny green snakes made of modeling clay to form my Medusa headdress. This might not be the most productive use of my time, but I fucking love Halloween, and I'm no longer so broke that I can't spare a few hours for a silly project.

I kiss him deep and hard. I kiss him like he kissed me at the art show—like I’ll eat him alive.

I fuck his mouth with my tongue like I wish he’d fuck me with cock: deep, filling his mouth all the way up.

We only break apart to breathe.

Cole’s eyes blaze darker than I’ve ever seen them.

“Come with me,” he orders.

His hand is locked around my wrist, dragging me toward the door.

We’re leaving together, and we both know where we’re going.

Until a broad, beefy figure steps in front of us, blocking our path.

## COLE

**S**haw knows.

The look of triumph on his face was unbearable.

He had no idea she was still alive.

He's been out wilding the last few weeks, not paying attention to me, his work, our mutual acquaintances, or anything else that should have tipped him off.

That's what happens when he goes on a frenzy: he disappears from the art world until the madness passes. Until he's ready to act sane again.

He killed two girls. That means there's one more to go.

He's never satiated until he takes the third. Then he goes quiet—sometimes for months at a time.

That's his cycle. I've watched it happen.

He's predictable. I'm afraid I can predict exactly what he'll do next:

He'll try to take Mara as his last kill.

He would love the symmetry of that—he was the one who gave her to me, and he could take her away.

He might do it just to see how I'd react. To see if he could truly make me snap.

I don't know how the fuck to stop it from happening. Even I can't watch Mara every minute, every hour. If Shaw is determined to hunt her, how the fuck can I keep her safe?

Especially when she's reckless and stubborn, determined to get herself killed. I saw the look in her eye—ordering her to stay away from Shaw only makes her want to defy me.

So I terrified her on purpose.

She thinks she isn't scared of monsters? I'll show her a fucking demon out of hell.

And it worked. She didn't come to the studio yesterday, or today either. I know how scared she must be if she stayed home when she's aching to work on her painting.

She's home, but not actually alone. I'm watching her right now through the telescope. Watching her lay in bed, reading.

She finished *Dracula*. Now she's started *The Butterfly Garden*. I'm not familiar with that one, but if it interests Mara, I want to read it. I want to know everything in her head.

I've been following her continually. It won't be enough.

Alastor won't give up that easy.

I could kill him.

That eventuality has always loomed between us.

He knows too much about me, and me about him.

I've been tempted to do it many times before.

I almost followed through after he deposited Mara in my dumping ground. I should have done it then.

I'm not afraid of Shaw. But I've put myself at a disadvantage: it's not just me versus him. I have to protect Mara, too—if I want to keep her safe for myself, for my own use.

I'm spread thin. Covering too much ground.

This is exactly why I always avoided these kinds of entanglements. Mara complicates my life in a hundred different ways.

Yet here I am neglecting my own work so I can watch her.

It's addicting. All-consuming. It has a literal physical effect on me when I'm not near her, when I can't see her. My muscles twitch like I've had too much caffeine. The craving builds and builds until I can't think about anything else. I lose all my powers of focus because my mind is pulled away after her.

Watching her creates the opposite effect. The drug courses through my veins and I'm soothed, relaxed, purposeful once more.

Several hours pass. It's late now—past midnight. I should go home and sleep in my own bed.

I stay because of the nagging sensation that she's not safe, not even asleep in her room.

Shaw is going to do something, I know it. He saw us at the party together, and now he's going to take some action, leave some sign to let me know that I didn't fool him for a second.

He must be over the fucking moon right now. His plan worked better than he ever could have dreamed.

All he wanted was to entice me into killing Mara. He never imagined that I might form an attachment to her.

And, as difficult as it is for me to admit . . . that's exactly what I've done. I'm fixated on her. Obsessed with her, even.

Which gives Shaw all the power he could desire and more. I've put my attachment onto something fragile, something impossible to keep safe and under my control.

It's exhausting. This level of focus is draining.

Also, I'm starting to realize that what entices me about Mara is the contact high I get when I'm near her. She feels things so intensely that it makes me

feel them too.

I have no control over that effect. I can't choose what to feel and what not to feel, not anymore. Mara infects me against my will.

Right now, she's so sleepy that she can barely keep her eyes open. Her head keeps nodding forward and then jerking up again, while she sits propped up on the pillows in her bed, trying to sneak in a few more pages of her paperback.

Watching her lashes flutter and the slow sway of her head is making me sleepy too. I'm leaning against the windowsill. Nearly drifting off . . .

Until a shadow moves under the trees behind Mara's house.

I jerk upright, pressing my eye against the telescope, swiveling the lens to look down instead of across.

I only catch a brief glimpse of the figure disappearing around the side of her house, but I know it's Shaw. Only he possesses that bulk, that heavy tread.

And only he would be lurking on her street, staring up at her window.

I push aside the telescope and slip my arms into my coat.

I don't like playing defense.

I'd rather be hunting than waiting.

Shaw exposes himself, coming out alone at night.

I've got a knife with me, and my garrote too.

I can end this right now.

I descend the stairs of the Georgian in the dark, leaving all the lights turned off. I slip through the front door, closing it behind me, the soft snick of the lock settling into place silent as a sigh.

At the far end of the street, Shaw's hulking frame is just turning the corner.

I trail him from a distance, knowing that I'll have to stalk him with much greater care than usual. Shaw may be impulsive, but he's not stupid.

Shaw likes to think we're the same species—lions hunting gazelles.

He's an animal, but I'm no fucking lion.

I'm me. Myself. The only one like me.

Our only commonality is that we're both predators. And all predators share certain characteristics. Our senses are heightened. We physically overpower. We kill and consume.

It will be hard to trail him unseen. To sneak up on him. To take him down without suffering serious injury or death. It benefits me nothing to kill Shaw if I bleed out right next to him.

So I follow with the appropriate level of respect.

Shaw walks rapidly, head down, hands in his pockets. He's dressed in dark sweats, hood up, like he was out for a nighttime jog. Really he's concealing his most memorable features, including that shock of sun-streaked hair.

He weaves, crossing over several streets, cutting through alleyways, jumping a chain-link fence at one point. I can't tell if this is his usual mode of travel, the most direct route wherever the fuck he's going, or if he suspects that I'm following him.

I know he hasn't actually seen me, but he came to Mara's house on purpose. He knows damn well I could have been watching.

He could be luring me somewhere right now.

The question is . . . do I want to be lured?

Plenty of women thought they were ensnaring Shaw when they flirted with him, when they enticed him back to their apartments. They ended up beheaded on the beach.

Predator and prey, hunter and hunted . . . it's not always obvious which one is which.

The puff adder puts out its tongue, mimicking the movement of an insect. A toad that believes it is hunting soon becomes the snake's dinner.



This intuition solidifies as Shaw leads me into the grittier part of the Mission District—where every window is covered in iron bars and nailed-up plywood, where the graffiti scrawls cover not only the walls but also the doorways and awnings. Where half the buildings seem perpetually under construction, propped up by scaffolding, under the shadow of which squatters congregate and petty drug dealers run their businesses.

I have no fear walking through an area like this. Criminals know who they can rob and who they should avoid at all costs. Only the young and foolish would approach a man with Shaw's bulk.

I'm something else entirely: a dark figure that repels even a curious glance. Gliding along like death, like famine, like a plague in their midst.

Shaw pauses outside a ramshackle building, one of several in a row. They might have been apartments once—now they're all condemned, their doors chained and locked.

After glancing to both sides, Shaw takes a key from his pocket, opens the padlock, and slips through the door.

I hesitate on the opposite corner, pondering my options.

He might be waiting inside for me. Hoping to attack me in this isolated place.

If that's his plan, I'm not averse. I want to end this thing between him and me. I want it over, one way or another.

Or he might truly be unaware that I'm following him. In which case, I'm curious what he keeps inside that building.

It feels like a trap. But also like an opportunity.

Stay or go? I've never been so torn.

If I go home, then tomorrow I'll be right back where I was, staked out by Mara's house, wracked by the paranoia of when and where Shaw will attack.

That's what pushes me to cross the road, to follow Shaw inside the crumbling tenement.

Inside is black as pitch, so damp that I can hear water dripping down from the upper levels. The stairs are crumbling, with large gaps between risers. The stench of moldering boards and stale urine assails my nostrils. Beneath that, the unmistakable smell of putrefaction. It could be rats that died in the walls. Or something else . . .

I stand perfectly still, listening for Shaw.

All I hear is that drip, drip, drip of water, and further up, wind groaning through open rafters.

I let my eyes adjust until I can make out enough detail to walk without tripping over the piles of old construction materials and the mounds of shredded tarp and old blankets where addicts have slept.

Shaw isn't on the main level. Which means I'll have to climb the stairs.

I make my way up slowly, careful not to dislodge a single pebble. Any sound will echo in this desolate space.

I'm not afraid. But I am aware that I could be walking to my death, or his. The next few minutes may be the most crucial of my life.

I see a light at the head of the stairs—dim and slightly purplish.

That is what assures me that Shaw has laid a trap. He's mimicking the light at the Halloween party. Taunting me with references to Mara.

Still, I keep climbing. I'm committed to this course. We both intend to see this through.

I step into the space at the top of the stairs. It's one, vast open cavern, all the walls knocked down.

In the center, I see a figure, suspended in space.

It's too late to go down the stairs—they're already inside the building. I can hear them swarming in, trying to be quiet, but failing miserably because cops are fucking awful at stakeouts.

Shaw called them. He trapped me in here with his latest kill. And I walked right into it, in the stupidest mistake I've ever made.

If I can't go down, there's only one way out.

Shucking off my coat, I wrap it around my arm and punch through the window. The cops hear the noise. They come thundering up the stairs at full speed, shouting to each other.

I'm already climbing out, scaling the rusty drainpipe running up the side of the building. The metal is eaten through like lace, crumbling under my hands, the screws pulling out and the whole pipe coming away from the wall. I barely have time to seize the gutter in one hand before I'm swinging out into open air.

I fall forward and down, arms stretched out in front of me. When my feet hit, I tuck into a roll and tumble across the roof, coming to a stop flat on my back.

Not fucking far enough. I hear sirens, cop cars pulling up on both sides. They'll be spread across the area in moments.

No time for strategy or planning. I leap to my feet and sprint again, running for the next building in the row.

*Run, run, run, run . . . JUMP!*

The third building is lower still, by two stories.

I crash down hard, my right ankle buckling beneath me. It twists and I hear an awful popping sound. Hot, electric pain shoots up the outside of my leg.

Forcing myself up anyway, I hobble to the edge of the building. This one has a fire escape still in place, running from roof to ground level. Using the railings as a crutch, I limp down as fast as I can, cursing my ankle, cursing that I've put myself in this fucking ludicrous position.

Outsmarted by Shaw . . . what a fucking humiliation. I should let the cops put me out of my misery.

Hitting the ground, I limp through the sickening pain, driven on by pure rage, by the desire to live through this so I can wreak my revenge on Shaw, so I can make him pay for this.

This is his fault.

His and Mara's.



IT TAKES over two hours to shake off the cops and return to Seacliff. Some of that time is me hiding in a filthy alleyway, crouching under a pile of moldering trash bags, ankle too swollen to run another step.

The ignominy of this is almost too much to bear.

It's late on a Sunday night. Most everyone who had laundry to do finished hours ago. Only one load remains rotating next to mine: a jumble of dingy gray socks, which I assume belong to the tiny Asian grandmother asleep against the vending machines.

Or maybe it's Cole who puts me in a frenzy.

I've never had as many ideas in a year as I now seem to get in a week. Even in my sleep, I see streams of layered images, colors so rich you could eat them, textures that make you want to roll them across your skin . . .

I know exactly what I need to do to finish my devil.

But to do it, I'll have to walk through Cole's door.

I don't think we're playing a game anymore.

*I filet people with precision . . .*

*He does what I do BADLY . . .*

Or the pure, unvarnished truth?

Two men. One heavy and rough. One slim, light, almost silent . . .

Convulsively, I clasp my palm over the wriggling scar running up my left wrist. I can feel it under my thumb, thick and hot as a snake.

I pace up and down the narrow aisle between the washing machines and the dryers, listening to my clothes rumbling away on both sides.

This all sounds insane.

But it's the only thing that makes sense. The only thing that explains what I know I saw.

Two men.

Two psychopaths.

I stop dead where I stand.

I've seen all the indications with Cole. The way he swaps personas at will. The way he uses his money and influence to manipulate people . . . including

me. The way he doesn't truly care about anyone or anything.

*That's not true. He cares sometimes. He cared when he smashed that solar model.*

I shake my head hard, irritated with myself.

*Rage isn't the same thing as "caring."*

My chest is tight and it's hard to draw a full breath.

I keep thinking about the girl's body found on the golf course. And the others on the beach . . .

I told myself that had nothing to do with me. I was cut, but not torn apart. Not actually killed.

He's just watching. Waiting.

Standing guard.

That chill now runs from the nape of my neck all the way down my spine.

I finally understand.

Cole's not watching *me*. He's watching for Shaw.

*Stay away from him. He's dangerous. I'm not fucking joking.*

It's too dark to see the details of Cole's face, not with the rain plastering his hair down over his eyes.

"Take me home."

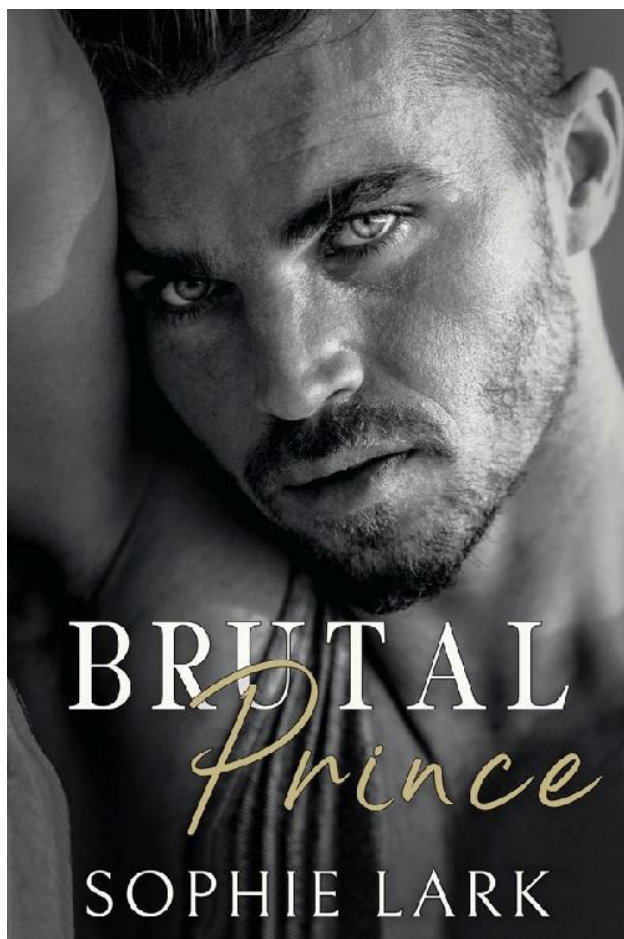




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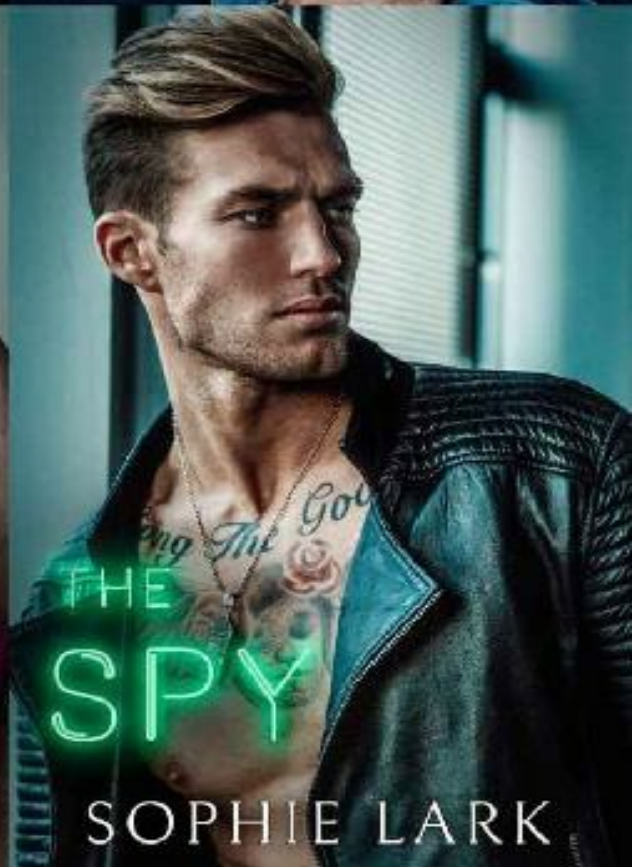
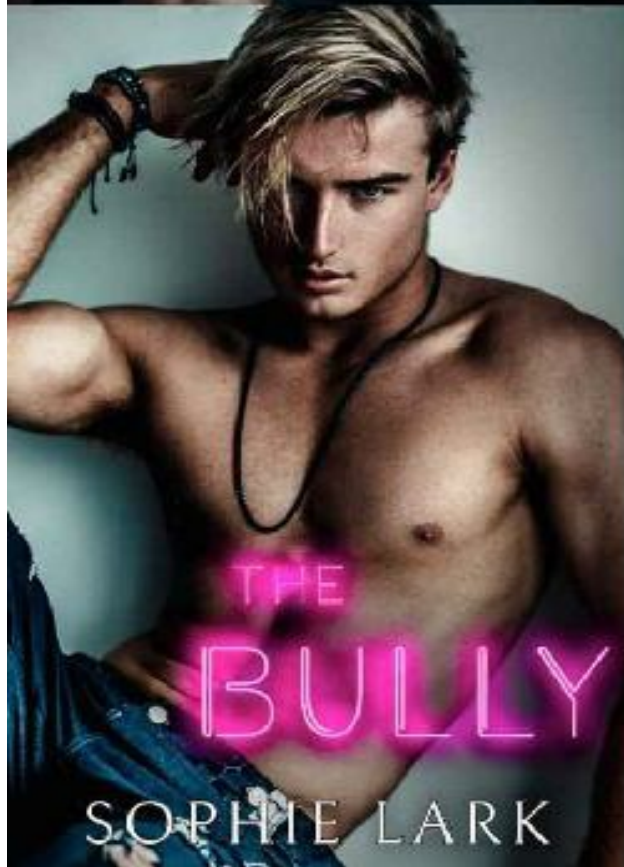
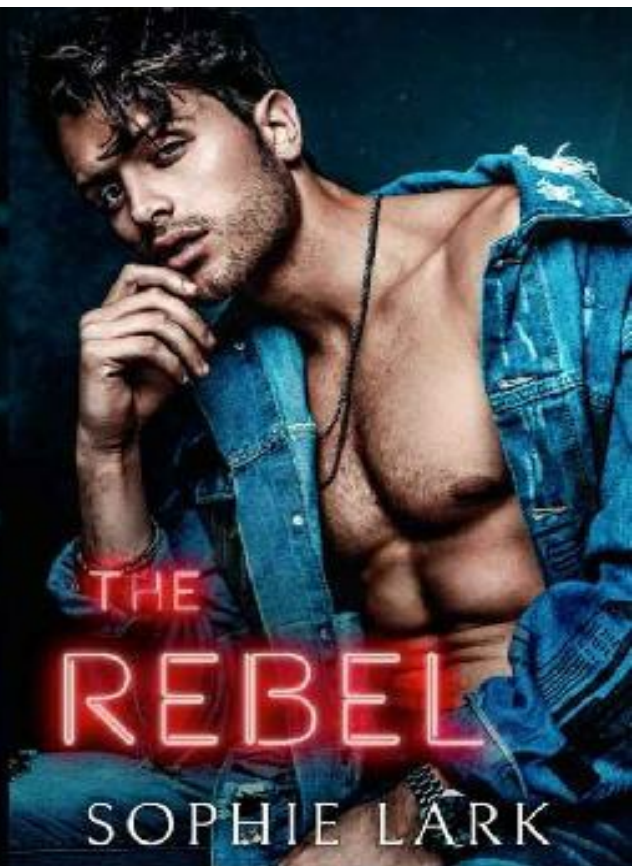




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
